The Emergence of Korean American Communities on the U.S.-Mexico Border

Based on in-depth interviews with Korean American border commuters, who resided in Southern California and worked in Mexico, the paper traces the development of Korean American border communities. Previous literature in border studies mostly focused on Mexicans who cross borders with their home and work split in two different countries, but Asian immigrants who are neither from Mexico nor the U.S. have been understudied. After explaining how Korean American border communities were developed and are structured, the paper discusses border anxiety that Korean border commuters experience in border crossing.

Minjeong Kim is associate professor of sociology at San Diego State University. Her research areas include gender and family in the context of international migration, and race and sexuality in the media. She is the author of the forthcoming book, *Elusive Belonging: Marriage Immigrants and "Multiculturalism" in Rural South Korea* (University of Hawai'i, 2018).
