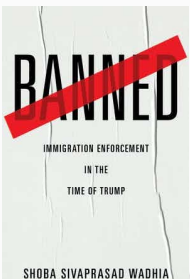

Shoba Sivaprasad Wadhia is Associate Dean for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion; the Samuel Weiss Faculty Scholar; and Clinical Professor of Law at Penn State Law in University Park. Her research focuses on the role of prosecutorial discretion in immigration law and the intersections of race, national security and immigration. She has also served as an expert witness, lead author or co-counsel in connection with Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA), the asylum ban, the travel ban, and prosecutorial discretion more generally.

Ingrid Eagly is Professor of Law at the UCLA School of Law who studies the intersection between immigration enforcement and criminal justice. She is also an affiliated faculty member of the UCLA Center for the Study of International Migration. Prior to joining the faculty at UCLA, Eagly served as a trial attorney for the Office of the Federal Public Defender in Los Angeles and a Soros Criminal Justice Fellow at the Coalition for Humane Immigrant Rights of Los Angeles (CHIRLA). She earned her A.B. in Public Policy, Women's Studies, and African American Studies from Princeton University and her J.D. from Harvard Law School. In 2017, she was awarded the Distinguished Teaching Award by the UCLA Academic Senate.



Within days of taking office, President Donald J. Trump published or announced changes to immigration law and policy. These changes have profoundly shaken the lives and well-being of immigrants and their families, many of whom have been here for decades, and affected the work of the attorneys and advocates who represent or are themselves part of the immigrant community. *Banned* examines the tool of discretion, or the choice a government has to protect, detain, or deport immigrants, and describes how the Trump administration has wielded this tool in creating and executing its immigration policy.

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
